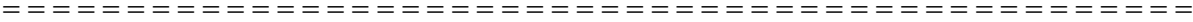

Meet Your Board Members

Arthur “Art” L. Larson



When I agreed to write an autobiographical sketch for the newsletter I had to decide what to write and how to write it. I remembered that for many months I had been writing “The Story of My Life.” When asked why and for whom I was writing it my answer was that I have had such a wonderful and remarkable life that I am enjoying reliving it through writing about it. Since I now have 88+ years to write about, it’s a story too long for the newsletter; therefore I’ve decided to summarize some highlights that relate to my life and career leading to Chabot.

I have concluded that my life has been shaped and influenced by three major forces: My Family, The Church and Military Service. The remarkable part is that my life and career have evolved without much effort on my part. Opportunities just seem to have opened before me.

I was born March 5, 1920 at Ft. Morgan Colorado. From the beginning my parents provided, by example, the basic values for my life. For 16 years we lived on a farm, and in 1936 we moved to Loveland, Colorado where Dad opened a hardware and farm equipment store. Both the farm and the store were family operations in which I was given increasing responsibility in the form of chores or jobs for which I was paid.

How fortunate I was the day Jo-an and I met as student teachers at Casey Junior High School in Boulder, Colorado. We became engaged on Valentines Day and were married in August. We are now celebrating our 57th anniversary. All through the years Jo-an’s love, care, support, and encouragement have supported me and my career. Our greatest blessing is our son, Eric and his family – Doris, Susie and Joanna. They bring much joy and fulfillment to our family. Eric changed his career goal from dentistry to follow me into student services. He is a senior member of the Student Services at Skyline Community College.

Church attendance and participation have always been the center of our spiritual and social life. My close and continuing friendships have been associated with the church. When in high school I set forth the purpose of my life “to so live to find favor and good understanding with God and Fellowman”.

My military service was the best training and experience I could have had in preparation for a career in education. Opportunities opened for me one after another in command and staff positions. I received great job satisfaction and recognition. I entered the service a private and came out a major. Teaching assignments and leadership responsibility – plus attendance at four military schools caused me to change my career goal from architecture to education. At the end of the war, I elected to go into the Army Reserve and return to the university.

To complete the requirements for a degree and a credential, student teaching was required. In my 2nd quarter, the 8th grade social science teacher suddenly resigned and I was hired to take his place, a position I kept for the next three years. An incident I’ll always remember is when I attended a teachers association meeting, spoke up and found myself elected President to lead salary negotiations!

A new opportunity came when I was offered a teaching job in San Leandro at twice my salary. I signed up and went home to tell Jo-an we were moving to California. In San Leandro I was assigned to an elementary school. Again this was providential for I shortly became a vice principal, then an elementary school principal and last the Principal of Bancroft Jr. High.

It was a lucky day for me when Reed Buffington and a group of Chabot Faculty members came to visit Bancroft. I don’t recall the details, but I know I was enticed to Chabot where I was offered a position with John McKinley, as Assistant Dean of Instruction for Evening and Extension and then as Associate Dean of Arts and Science. Then came the challenge as Dean of Student Services. The privilege to have served with Reed Buffington, John McKinley, Bill Moore and Dick Yeo is deeply appreciated as the highlight of my career, as is the collegial association with other members of the administration, the student services, the faculty and the staff with whom I worked.

Now, I am in my 25th year of retirement. The time has passed quickly. Jo-an and I enjoy our family time together, memories of trips and vacations, volunteering and the continuing friendship and association with those with whom I’ve worked with or met throughout my career. I take great satisfaction knowing that C.A.R.E. is in good hands meeting its purpose.

A Valley Campus Success Story

In March, 1975 I ventured out to what was then known as Chabot College-Valley Campus. I was an older student at the time, but the term "Re-entry Student" had not yet been coined. I was just the "older lady" at the ripe old age of 25! I was a bit apprehensive to say the least! Would I fit in and could I do it? Fortunately, Spring Quarter did not have a lot of new students and some were even older than I. My first three classes were: Spanish 1A with Maria Elena Pelinen, Health 1 with Sophie Rheinheimer and California History with Joe Downs. Dr. Barbara Mertes was our Dean. We had 4 buildings, with another two "under construction". My first impression was that of a caring institution and a wonderful learning experience. To this day I have not changed my mind on that score.

I worked as a student assistant in the Library, and in Admissions & Records with Ginny MacCrossen, Marge O'Leary and Linda Pfeiffer. We had one of our earthquakes during my Library days, I can still remember gluing many books back to their bindings. After I graduated in 1980, I then came back as on "on call hourly" employee. In 1984, I was hired part-time for the Assessment position. Working part-time enabled me to continue my education at CSUH earning my BA in History and Women's Studies in 1990. I later earned my MA in Humanities. With the encouragement from faculty and the many friends I made over the years here, kept me on my quest to further my education (something I had NO IDEA I would do back in 1975)! This year, I begin my 25th. year at LPC.

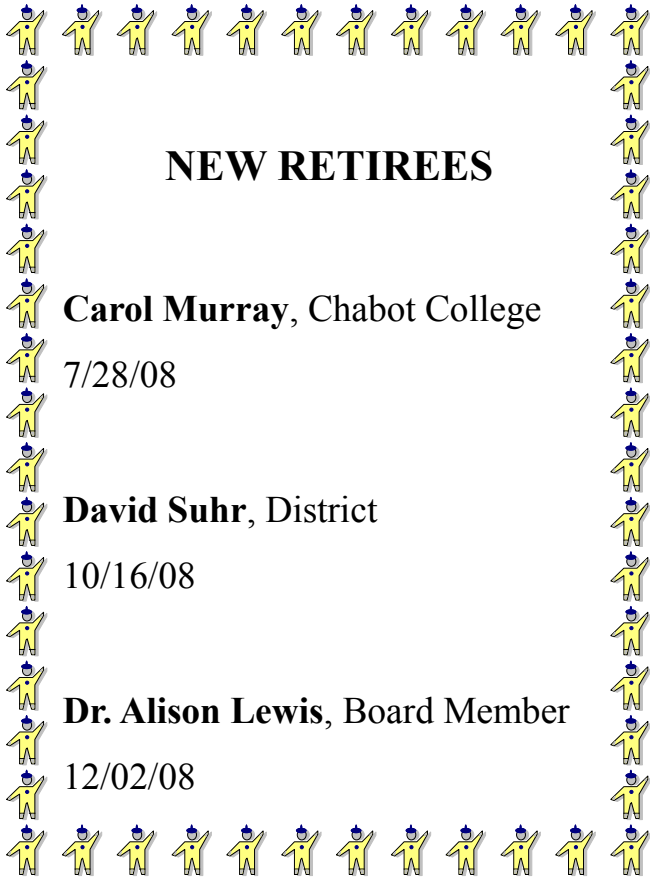
