MEET YOUR BOARD MEMBERS—William (Bill) Threlfall

I'm the 7th William Threlfall in a long line of California natives. My great-great grandfather, William Threlfall, and his wife Elizabeth came to Illinois from England in 1827 and then moved on to California in 1854. They are buried in Mission San Jose. Although I grew up in San Jose and now live in Oakland, I'm a Livermore valley kid: I was born in 1944 at the Camp Shoemaker Naval Hospital, near what is now the Hacienda Crossing shopping center in Dublin. My father, William Threlfall (not very imaginative, were we?), taught Navigation at Camp Shoemaker during WWII.

I contracted poliomyelitis, often known as "infantile paralysis", in 1945 shortly after a summer stay at the Oak Knoll Naval Hospital. Polio was particularly infections at that time of year, and we always suspected the hospital as the source. Compared with some, I was fortunate to have only moderate lasting effects, though I wore a leg brace for years and underwent five corrective surgeries, all of which took place during summer vacations. After surgery, I felt real frustration with being laid up indoors, looking out the window at other kids playing.

I grew up in San Jose, having a pretty good childhood overall. Both parents were teachers, and summers not committed to a surgery typically involved camping at Tahoe or travel. We lived just a block from the high school where my father headed the Science Department, and I had the not-so-optimum experience of taking a year of Chemistry from him. He expected perfection from me, but I let him down, missing 2 test questions out of nearly 1,100 for the year. During this time, I got involved with "hi-fi", built electronics kits, took radios apart, built a go-kart, was elected class VP, and messed around as high-school kids often do.

I went on to San Jose State to earn a B.A. in 1967 and an M.A. 1968 in Psychology. While an undergraduate, I worked for about 9 month in a job that shaped a lot of my approach to problems thereafter – I was employed as an appliance repairman at Sunbeam Service Co. I expected to receive detailed on-the-job training about repair methods; instead, there was none. When I tackled my first faulty toaster and asked what steps to follow, I was told: "take it apart and figure out what's wrong." Amazingly, once granted this permission to disassemble and investigate, I did just fine, and I've used that approach with technical problems ever since.

As a graduate student at San Jose State, I served as TA for the Psychology Department, performing all the computer data analysis needed by the Psychology Department faculty and teaching computer programming in Fortran to graduate students. Also, during my Master's program, I taught three courses at Gavilan College on the authority of my Community College Teaching Credential application (yes, credentials were required then). This valuable community college experience brought in a few dollars and gave me a real interest in Oakland A's baseball, which I listened to during the commute from San Jose to Gilroy.

I had considered moving directly from my M.A. program to a Ph.D. program, but my Master's thesis advisor cautioned me about the lifestyle impact of the "academic rat race." He encouraged me to teach a couple of years to gain real-world experience and social maturity before moving on in an the academic career.

So I applied at Chabot in 1968, where they were looking for someone young. At that time there was a perceived problem that the Social Science Division was overpopulated by faculty retired from other careers. At age 23, when I interviewed with Superintendent-President Reed Buffington, he growled: "What makes you think you're qualified for this job?" Of course, he was more interested in the manner of my response than the content – he just wanted to see how I reacted when poked with a "sharp stick." In any event, he hired me – naïve youth to balance an entire division from the other end of the age spectrum. I took the job expecting to stay at Chabot a couple of years and then return to graduate school. But after a few years, I became accustomed to receiving an income, and I realized that Bay Area community college job opportunities had dried up. If I quit my job to return to grad school, I couldn't be confident that I could return to a similar position. So I soldiered on...

In 1978, at a 10-year reception hosted by the Board, one Board Member commented: "only 20 more years to go and then you can retire". This comment startled me and proved to be the seminal event that led me back to graduate school – I wanted more career choice! In 1979 I began pursuit of a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology at Stanford.

Sandy Jafferies and I married in 1973 at my family home at Lake Tahoe. In 1980, my daughter Sarah was born. I'm proud that she has gone on to earn an M.P.H. from UCLA and is working at Kaiser's national headquarters on wellness programs.

After receipt of my Ph.D, I became Chabot's first Coordinator of Institutional Research and continued this duty while also teaching until 1992. During this period, I served as President of the NORCAL Community College Research Group, which later merged into the statewide RPGroup. Through the State Chancellor's Office, I published a Matriculation assessment technical manual and several research designs as part of the Matriculation local research options project.

In '91 and '92, I Chaired a District-wide task force charged with recommending for new administrative software and hardware. I managed the RFP process, product demonstrations, and contract development.

Shortly thereafter, I was selected to serve in my only administrative position: Chief Management Information Officer. I developed a 7-year budget and project plan to implement the new computer systems and software that were selected by the Task Force. In this position I managed all aspects of District administrative systems, and it was a time of great change: we retired the old, costly mainframe computer; we connected the District to the internet and built networks on both campuses; we implemented telephone and web registration, etc. I loved this job and was supported by a terrific classified team. However, it was exhausting; the job is never done because technology is ever-changing, and in 1999 at the end of the seven year project, I "retired" to classroom. Shortly thereafter, I became certified by Cisco Systems and established a computer networking lab and classes at Chabot, teaching those as well as Psychology classes.



By Fall 2002, I adopted a reduced load contract. This proved to be good training for a post-retirement lifestyle and spending pattern. In December 2005, I formally retired. Soon after, I was surprised to receive a pleasant letter from Art Larson, CARE President, apprising me of the organization's functions and inviting me to the January reunion. I had not even been aware of CARE's existence! In June 2006, I joined the CARE Board and undertook a few communications tasks on its behalf.

Similarly, since 2003 I have provided behind-the-scenes support for my wife's non-profit, Waterfront Action, which promotes public access to the waterfronts of Oakland and Alameda and educates the public about local waterfront opportunities. I was recently privileged to win a national award for the interactive waterfront maps at www.waterfrontaction.org/map.

Always interested in vehicles, at various times, I have owned two motorcycles, a Corvette, two BMWs, and an Alfa Romeo, which I kept for 155k miles!

Most years now, I spend May through September at our family home at Lake Tahoe. I enjoy gardening, bear management, social occasions with guests, and even a swim or two when the lake warms up in late summer. We have almost no television service, which provides a refreshing sort of "unplugging".

I was nostalgic at recent retirement parties for three of my MIS classified staff, but after 37.5 years of service, I'm done! I'm content to continue support activities for CARE and Waterfront Action, pursue gardening, cooking classes, a men's book group, and my stereo interest. Also, I'm "dialing it down", sleeping somewhat more and feeling less urgency in life.






REUNION 2010
