Build it and they will come! Building 3400, Automotive Technology, is ready to begin renovation. The remodel facilities will include a large automotive lab and a smart classroom with complete AV capabilities. The building will house the BMW technology program.

The Building 1700 Math and Science classroom project is getting underway. The contract was awarded to BHM

Construction at the March Board meeting and will be partially funded by the State. This project modernizes inefficient classrooms and instructional spaces and provides expanded technical and media services. New landscaping between buildings

1700 and 1800 will also be included. This landscaped space will contain plant species not located elsewhere on campus and will serve as an outdoor classroom.



The Building 1200 and Performing Arts Center Plaza project is nearing completion, with only finishing touches remaining. The renovated building houses music performance spaces, practice rooms and the Little Theater, while an addition houses a new recording studio. The renovated plaza contains an outdoor stage and related seating areas.

Revisiting Las Positas College! ("What a difference a Bond Measure makes!")

For those folks who haven't been back to LPC (or more historically Chabot College-Valley Campus) recently, you would not recognize the place! The little college in Livermore has grown-up!

View looking from the PE Complex down to the rest of the campus No one could ever have imagined how the campus would change from a small cluster of 4 buildings in 1975 to the present-day modern, expansive college campus of 2013. When the college first opened its

doors, our neighbors were all farmers and ranchers. Fences kept cattle out, and wayward staff and students in. Back then, a colleague once answered the

community telephone with the salutation, "...Hello, Frontier Village......" Needless to say, when overheard by the college President (AKA Dr. Barbara Mertes), he was reprimanded and relegated to the 'south 40' to chase cattle off college land.

As time went by and the college continued to grow, fence lines were moved further and further up the hills. Bulldozers and earth movers leveled the ground for new buildings: Automotive Technology, the Little Theatre, the Learning Resource Center, the Science Building. Growth was steady, but agonizingly slow.

THEN, in March 2004, voters approved ('barely') Bond Measure B. Las Positas College was given the go-ahead to build-out the campus! Plans were created for the Physical Education Complex and Aquatic Center, the Multi-Disciplinary Building, the Childhood Development Center, the Science Building-Part II, Mertes Center for the Arts, and the grand Student Services Administrative Building. A Campus Boulevard running through the center of the campus would pull everything together.

Today, the college sits along the hillside surrounded by a housing tract of garden apartment homes, vineyards, and business complexes. (Costco is only one mile away.) A 1.25 mile campus loop road surrounds the college. Parking lots are everywhere, and solar panels have been erected in several of them. (They provide welcome shade during those scouring Livermore summers.)

The last decade has been a time of tremendous growth and physical change for Las Positas College. You MUST come back for a visit. Some things still feel and look familiar, but you will be in a constant state of awe. The campus is breathtaking!

Later, I became the Director of Human Resources. There were many challenging factors in Human Resources. I have fond memories of working with wonderful people at both campuses and the District Office. Things started to change in the community college system so I decided it was time to retire, which I did in October 2002.

Ron introduced me to performance cars, starting with Corvettes and moving on to Porsches. Together we enjoyed autocrossing and joined car clubs in the Bay Area and drove in competition events throughout the state. Time Trials with Porsches was our next racing venue. There were not a lot of competitive ladies' driving then, so often I was out there with men and doing pretty well. Later, I worked on a professional race car team. I did the timing and scoring. I worked the 24 Hours of LeMans in France from 1978 to 1982 and on an Indy 500 team from 1988 to 1991. One of my greatest pleasures was meeting actor Paul Newman,



who drove one of the team cars at LeMans. Our relationship continued over the years.

I enjoy wine tasting. My husband and I joined a small group of wine-appreciative friends for "blind" wine tasting. We belong to several wine clubs in Sonoma, Sierra Foothills and Paso Robles and currently maintain a wine cellar with over 1000 bottles. My other hobby is playing golf. I have been very fortunate to travel to many places in the world. Cruising is my favorite way to travel.

The Red Shoes

"A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his influence stops." The Education of Henry Adams, Henry Brooks Adams

The other day, as I was browsing the daily newspaper's TV log, I came across a listing for "The Red Shoes," that wonderful ballet film starring a young, red-headed Moira Shearer, a film that I had loved since I first saw it in the early 50's. Like many other young girls, I had a secret wish in those days to be a ballerina, and even though the film ended sadly, I thought it a thrilling story.

These days, when I think of "The Red Shoes," I think of Eddie L., a student of mine in the early 1990's, one of many immigrants I taught over the years, new arrivals working for a future in America by taking classes at a low-cost community college. Eddie, by all measures, was unremarkable-- a native of Hong Kong, here with a brother and some cousins, working long hours for little pay, and taking as many classes as he could fit into a day with only 24 hours. In class, he was frequently sleepy, sitting in a back row corner, often resting his head against the wall, rarely speaking, never holding my gaze for long. It was only when I gave my usual assignment of daily journal writing that I really began to know the pain that lay behind his inscrutable expression.

My first reading of Eddie's journal was a shock. Where many students had begun by writing dutiful daily half-pages of superficial blather about boys and homework assignments and the difficulty of their English class, Eddie's entries went on for pages. He talked about feeling worthless, about the crushing poverty and cramped conditions in the tiny apartment he shared with seven family members, about the fall from high outdoor stairs in Hong Kong which fractured his skull, leading to months of hospitalization and leaving him with a two-inch long vertical indentation on one side of his forehead. He felt disfigured and useless, and to an alarming extent, almost suicidal. I spent a long time deciding how to respond to his revelations, in the end simply telling him in a long note that he had worth and value and a future. I found places in his writing to praise, and asked questions about some of his comments. He reacted to my note by writing ever-longer entries (and getting back longer ones from me), draft after draft of papers, and a gradual, tentative participation in class. I can't say he bloomed, by any means, but he did raise himself from the level of despair I had seen initially. He passed the class with a C.

As usual, the semester ended too quickly, with me feeling that I had done an inadequate job helping Eddie to find his way. One day, just before final exams, Eddie showed up at my office with a question about an assignment. He talked shyly about his job at the local video store, and I volunteered the information that I was a movie buff. After that, we had a brief but animated conversation about favorite films. Then he left. He showed up the day of the final, wrote his exam and disappeared without a goodbye or any word. I felt disappointed and somehow at fault for not extending myself further.

The last day of the school year, after finals were over and I had read my last huge pile of student papers, I came to campus to turn in grades. In my mailbox I found a wrapped package and a note from Eddie. In the package was a video of "The Red Shoes," and a long, painstakingly written note which said, among other things, "You listened when no one else heard. Please don't forget me. I'll never forget you. For the rest of your life, you have an friend."

I think that virtually every teacher who reads this will have his or her own special memories of some special students. As for me, I don't talk about my own teaching much, or even think of it too often any more, but once in a while my memory is jogged and I remember once again what a thrilling profession teaching can be. You know what I mean.

Go Green Ends!

We regret to announce the suspension of CARE's "Go Green" program, in which members elected to read the CARE Newsletter online. While the program attracted nearly 100 participants, records showed that only about half of these participants actually opened CARE e-mail messages linking to the online newsletter.
