Scott Hildreth and Tim Dave are working together with adjunct faculty Shanon Lee, Robert Moore, Gabriel Prochter, and Bill Pezzaglia to maintain equipment and present fine programs to the community.

Community programs. The Astronomy and Physics faculty are working to promote community involvement. Many elementary schools are bringing their students to the Planetarium. It has become a tradition. And on August 21, 2017 there will be a total eclipse in North America extending from Washington and Oregon to Georgia, and the faculty have planned a special community event. They will bring the telescopes outside between buildings 1700 and 2000.

LAS POSITAS COLLEGE NEWS

Las Positas College has attained another success in its exceptional range of programs and opportunities tailored for veterans. The College has a well-developed <u>Veterans First program</u>, which provides comprehensive direction and resources for veterans returning to college. Notable aspects of the program include the <u>LPC Vet Stories</u> project which won a 2016 CARE Grant.

In 2013, Las Positas College partnered with Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (LLNL) to create a two-year degree programs in Engineering Technology to meet the demand for highly skilled engineering technologists in the East Bay. Veterans to Technology is a sub-program tailored for veterans which combines career technical education with hands-on internships at LLNL. On March 9 2017, Veterans to Technology won the 2017 East Bay Innovation Award from the East Bay Economic Development Alliance.

This winning program and its award are described in the East Bay Innovation Awards article: Veterans fill the technology skill gap.

The White House's **Joining Forces** program has recognized **Veterans to Technology** as a national best-practice model for retraining returning veterans. Bravo!



Remembering Chet Rhoan by Bill Threlfall

CARE Past-President Chet Rhoan passed away in November 2016 after a long struggle with declining health. I feel a special affiliation with Chet as he and I were hired by Chabot College on the same day in 1968. At that time, the Social Science Division was characterized by rather senior faculty with military or religious backgrounds, and the college administration made a decision to reach out for younger candidates. At our hiring, Chet was 29 and I was 23. Accordingly, the mean age in the division dropped precipitously! Although I did not interact with Chet on a daily basis, I knew him for a long time. This is my opportunity to share some memories of his skills and contributions:

I always think of Chet as a union man. From his early days as a locomotive fireman to his time as an active member of the Chabot Local 1440 of the American Federation of Teachers, he was a consistent union activist representing the interests of workers and the value of work itself.

When I hear the word "parliamentarian", I always immediately think of Chet. He was a ready front-line resource on questions of parliamentary procedure. Chet was a champion of the Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure and appreciat-

ed its nuanced differences from the more traditional Robert's Rules of Order.

In retirement, Chet served CARE well. As President, he exhibited thoughtful leadership, initiating a reexamination of CARE's work and services to members. Moreover, Chet ran a good meeting,



and we got stuff done! Chet kept CARE meetings on-track, supplying enough gentle structure to assure progress on the agenda yet preserving an informal climate that let folks speak their mind.

Chet's writing was marked by scholarship. As an example, consider his thoroughly researched and documented CARE History Project piece: <u>Move the Previous Question: The Chabot Faculty Senate 1980-2010</u>, which contains 32 reference citations!

Board Policy Board Policy Issue Resolved Retiree Medical Benefits Preserved

CARE's vigilance and advocacy has paid off for retirees. We are pleased to announce that Board Policy 7380 has been revised by the District Board of Trustees, incorporating new language proposed by CARE. The revision is the culmination of a year-long process initiated by CARE, and it corrects policy flaws that threatened long-established retirement health benefits.

What Happened

Beginning in Spring 2013, the Chabot-Las Positas Community College District launched an ongoing project to update its board policies and administrative procedures. On August 18, 2015, the District replaced the previous board policies pertaining to retirement medical benefits by board policy BP 7380, Retiree Health Benefits, which essentially deleted all detail previously included in previous policies and replaced it with remarkably flawed language that provided no coverage for classified, administrative, and confidential/supervisory employees, and made retirees fully responsible for the costs of the retirement benefits.

What CARE Did

CARE officers discovered the policy defects and brought the matter to the CARE board for action. On March 7, 2016, CARE wrote to Chancellor Jackson requesting an opportunity to work constructively with District staff to address our concerns. The Chancellor was responsive to this request and soon thereafter, CARE representatives met with District staff to present suggested policy revisions. That meeting ended on a positive note; however, it proved to be the beginning of a lengthy process that just recently concluded. District staff needed time to seek input from their attorney and from a board policy consultant that the District had retained.

In addition, District protocol requires that board policy revisions go through a shared governance process with participation by the unions, campus groups, and leaders. To facilitate this process, last summer CARE enlisted the collaboration of the Chabot-Las Positas Faculty Association (CLPFA) and the Service Employees International Union Local 1021. Working together, we developed a <u>single joint recommendation</u> for revised language for BP7380.

This collaborative partnership proved essential to the ultimate success of the policy revision initiative. Our joint approach put all parties "on the same page", presenting a unified voice to District representatives. Also, the initiative gained authority because the unions have standing under State law to negotiate with the District, while CARE lacks such standing, as we are not an employee union. And finally, the CLPFA contributed significant leadership time and legal support to help move the parties toward agreement. CARE wishes to recognize the CLPFA's generosity and collaboration in this successful joint effort to protect the retirement medical benefits of retirees and current employees.

The Outcome

After an almost year-long process of back-and-forth communications, draft revisions, and institutional review that tested the patience of all involved, on February 21, 2017, the Trustees of the Chabot-Las Positas Community College District adopted revisions to Board Policy 7380 that resolve all the concerns presented by CARE in March of 2016.

Flawed Policy adopted August 18, 2015	Policy as revised February 21, 2017
Health benefits <u>only</u> for retired <u>academic</u> employees. Nothing for others.	Health benefits for all retired employees: academic, classified, administrative, confidential/supervisory.
Benefits provided at the retiree or surviving spouse's/domestic partner's own expense.	Benefits provided as specified in the collective bargaining agreements: Depending on hire date: 1. at the retiree's own expense, 2. at the District's expense, 3. or with expense shared by the retiree and District.
Optional vision care plan benefits <u>not</u> included.	Health and welfare plan and optional dental and/or vision care benefit plans all included .
Definitions and use of various terms inconsistent.	Inconsistencies remedied; clarifications added.

Back Then ...

Vaccine Payments under Medicare Plans

I'm sharing recent learning experience with billing for a tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (TDAP) vaccine.

For years, I've received vaccines, including "flu shots", at my doctor's office. Recently, I went in for a flu shot and was told I also needed a tetanus shot. Both were administered in the office and were billed to my insurance, which is an Anthem Blue Cross Medicare Advantage plan. Insurance paid for the administration of both vaccines and for the influenza vaccine, but denied payment for the TDAP vaccine. Puzzled, I began an investigation into Medicare rules, and it yielded these findings:

Medicare Part B, required of all eligible CLPCCD retirees, pays for doctor's office visits and for these specific vaccines only:

- Influenza virus vaccine
- Pneumococcal pneumonia vaccine
- Hepatitis B vaccine (for patients at high or intermediate risk)
- Vaccines directly related to the treatment of an injury or direct exposure to a disease or condition

Payment for any other vaccines <u>supplied by your doctor's of</u>fice will be denied by Part B.

Other vaccines generally will be covered under your Medicare Part D drug plan, but most doctors' offices cannot bill Part D. Only a pharmacy or hospital that supplies the vaccine can bill Part D.

As a consequence, I needed to pay the doctor's billing department \$73 for the TDAP vaccine. I was then able to file a claim form to my Medicare Part D drug plan for reimbursement. The form requires a good bit of detail, some of which is a challenge to obtain: drug NDC number, an II-digit National Drug Code that is unique to the particular vaccine received, exact drug name, physician NPI number, physician invoice, paid receipt, etc. As an example, here is a link to the form I completed.

Recognizing that this reimbursement process is burdensome, Medicare suggests an alternative wherein the physician provides a prescription, your pharmacy provides the vaccine, and then it is administered by the pharmacist or delivered to your physician for administration. Under this alternative, the physician bills Part B and the pharmacy bills Part D. The following Medicare document fully describes the payment guidelines and administration alternatives:

Vaccine and Vaccine Administration Payments Under Medicare Part D.

For a Kaiser Senior Advantage Medicare Plan, the patient's experience may be simpler because the services of the doctor's office, pharmacy, and hospital are operated under a single organization which can perform all



Medicare billing. Nevertheless, Section 8 of Kaiser's Medicare Advantage Evidence of Coverage describes the very same issues and payment scenarios and ends with the caution: "You may want to call our Member Services Contact Center before you get a vaccination."

<u>Bottom line</u>: Your doctor's office can supply and bill Part B for flu, pneumonia, or hepatitis vaccine.

For other vaccines, have the doctor provide a prescription, if needed, to your pharmacy where the vaccine can be provided, administered and charged to your Part D.

Kaiser subscribers may want to call the Member Services Contact Center for guidance before getting a vaccination.
