#### Columbian Mammoths walked... at Las Positas College!


Even bigger than their more famous Woolly mammoth cousins, Columbian mammoths lived in warmer climates and did not have the dense fur. In November of 2009, construction was being done off the Loop road at LPC, by a backhoe. When about 8 feet down, the driver hit something very solid. It was quickly determined to be a large bone, and was treated as a significant fossil find by the State of California. PaleoResources sent Dr. Dave Haasl to stabilize and transport the bones to their lab.



After several months of hard work,

the bones had been strengthened with epoxy-like substances, and Dr. Haasl had fitted them with supportive plaster jackets to protect them. It was determined that the find included the left front leg bones; the humerus, radius and ulna. At this point the state of California dictated that the bones go to the designated repository, at the Paleontology department of UC Berkeley.

I began working to get the bones 'loaned back' to the college for display. This has been a longer and more difficult process than I could ever have imagined...there is no protocol for such a unique find! The continuing turnover in college administrators increased the delays, because I would have to start over explaining this amazing opportunity to the new person...again and again.



Eventually, Dan Cearley from Anthropology and I were able to go measure the bones, and then a few weeks later, go pick them up. Mind you, this was in 2019; it took 10 years with all the snafus and staff changes. Bottom line- we have the bones on campus now, and are hard at work getting a display case ordered, and planning an art installation to show the size of the actual animal. Stay tuned- this saga has been long and complicated, but I have every faith we will get it done.



#### **Meet your Board Members - Irene Plunkett**



My relationship with Chabot College began, in a way, in the late 1950's and early '60's. My parents, Richard and Marion Plunkett, had moved from Oakland (where I was born) to Hayward as they realized that they could use my dad's G.I. Bill (he had been in the 1st Marine Divi-

sion in WWII) to buy a house. The downside was that they loved Oakland. They had met at the old University High there, and it was the place my mother's family had immigrated to from New Brunswick, Canada. Even then, Oakland was a cool place and it was easy to get to the City. By contrast, Hayward was still agrarian in the early 50's and our tract, Schafer Park, was mostly tomato fields filled with jack rabbits.

My dad tried to use the educational part of his GI Bill to work on his Bachelor's degree, though that meant a trip to San Francisco City College—a tough go after commuting for work from Hayward to Oakland and back.

Eventually, though, the community voted the funds for a community college which soon (after a brief spell in San Leandro) came to reside in Hayward. Not long before, in 1959, Cal State Hayward had been established and my parents, and lots of others as well, felt pleased that their children would have access to at least two local colleges.

After graduating from Mt. Eden High School, I attended Willamette University (in Salem, OR) for my undergraduate work and then San José State for my Master's work. For awhile, I worked for Bay City News Service with founder and editor Dick Fogel as the first San Francisco Bureau Chief of that new, regional wire service.

One day, Dick came up to me and noted that somebody from Chabot College had put in a request for one of us to sit on the professional advisory panel for the communications major there. He looked at me, "You interested?" I said sure—partly because I was interested, and partly because an occasional break from the minute-to-minute deadlines of a wire service was starting to sound good.

The faculty member who had put in the request was, of course, Stan Lichtenstein. In those days, VATEA funding of vocational programs required that those programs be informed by working professionals in the field. The panel proved to be interesting and lively and gave me a glimpse into the college as well.

Later, I left that position and took a teaching job at the American Language Program at Cal State Hayward. That intensive ESL program refined the linguistics training I had in graduate school and give me experience in teaching multiple levels, in testing, and in assessment and placement. One day, one of my colleagues said rather casually to me, that I should look at Chabot College as another possible teaching site. It hadn't occurred to me, but the timing was good. The ALP was a good teaching gig, but the opportunities there were limited.

I did find my way to Chabot, discovered the English department (in the old building 700), and met division secretary Gay Conner and department chair Leland Kent. As it turns out, there was a need for an evening ESL instructor—this time working not with privileged I-20 students, but with refugees from Southeast Asia and immigrants from all over. Eventually, I was able to secure a full-time, tenure-track position in the English department and my teaching duties expanded to composition, reading, and literature. I was able to write a U.S. Women's Literature course and have it approved for Chabot and for transfer as well.

Later, my work expanded further as my co-madres—Theresa Lebeiko, Jeanine Paz, Jane Wolford, Margarita Olimpio-Segura, and Vicki Morrow—developed TWSP—The Women's Studies Project, a cross-curricular focus on women's issues and contributions. This work and this team informed a great deal of my career. Our work was complemented by grant work focused on helping women to enter and to succeed in non-traditional careers; this project became Women's Programs and Services, coordinated by Chabot math instructor Harriet Hungate and later by me.

With my second sabbatical and lots of extra hours, I was able to complete my Ph.D. in Philosophy and Religion with an emphasis on Women's Spirituality and wrote and taught a course with that name as well.

Even in retirement, I continue work in many of these areas as well as with the labyrinth, an ancient walking meditation pattern, promoting its use in higher education through Veriditas, a non-profit devoted labyrinth education.

#### **CARE Grants Update**

Each year, our grant program awards a portion of our charitable <u>CARE Fund</u> earnings to stimulate special projects that help Chabot-Las Positas employees do a better job of serving students, staff, and the colleges. In the eight years of the grant program's operation, we have awarded 57 grants totaling \$22,371, all of which has been contributed by the generous donations of CARE members like you!

For 2018-2019, CARE awarded \$2498 in grants to twelve great proposals, and three of them are highlighted below:

#### **Community Oral Health Projects**

Submitted by Juilie Coan of Chabot College | Manager/Supervisor: Dale Wagoner Award: \$142

Julie Coan, Dental Hygiene Instructor, sought funds to acquire two "Rex the Dinosaur" dental puppets for use in community dental health programs operated by Chabot dental hygiene students. These programs provide practical experience teaching dental hygiene practices to children 3-10 years of age.

Outcome: The puppets are now used by students to instruct children in the Chabot College Dental Hygiene Clinic as regularly scheduled patients, and they are used in outreach programs such as the annual "Give Kids a Smile Day", providing free dental hygiene services to children in the community.




#### Periodic Table for Studying

Mary Love, Instructional Assistant in the STEM Center applied for a grant to fund a large, wall-mounted periodic table of the elements for ready visual access in the Center.

Outcome: The applicant reported: "The periodic table has been a massive help when tutoring our students. You can see it from anywhere in the room. Students don't have to go rummaging through their backpacks to find a periodic table or waste time trying to pull one up on their phone. Our Chemistry students really appreciate it and when they walk into the center, they know immediately that we are there to support them."



#### Disposable Earplugs for Library Students -

Diana Navarro-Kleinschmidt, Library Services Specialist, planned a pilot test of disposable earplugs to meet the needs of students who require quiet in their studies and reading.

Outcome: Success was reported for the pilot project, together with a plan to continue the practice: "Since offering our library students these disposable earplugs, we have already gone through half our supply! We expect that we will need to reorder more in the Fall! The library has had far fewer complaints of the noise."




