Board Bio: Katherine Tollefsen

In my twenties, I had been taking different classes at Chabot working slowly toward an AA, but I wasn't sure what my major was yet. I also took classes like typing and word processing to improve my office/job skills. One of my teachers, Jane Berg, was the one who recommended that I apply for jobs at the college, so that's how my twenty-eight-year career began with CLPCCD.

I first started working at Chabot College in January of 1992. I was hired by Dr. Ruth Self and Carlo Vecchiarelli. I was the "Active Records" clerk in Admissions & Records. My supervisor was Susan Ludwig Clark. I learned a lot in A & R and enjoyed working with a very nice group of people. In my job I interacted with the counseling department, so I had easy access to asking the counselors academic questions about my goals. Working in A & R also gave me direct access to the records evaluators, so when I submitted the form to have my transcript evaluated, I was very pleased to find out that I was very close to earning my AA. I graduated from Chabot in 1993. By this time I had decided I wanted to be an elementary school teacher.

I continued to work in A&R for a couple of years before applying for a job in the Counseling department at Las Positas. It was a lateral move, but I enjoyed being a Counseling Assistant and interfacing more directly with students. By now I had transferred to Cal State Hayward but was only able to attend part-time while still working full-time. Sometimes it felt like I was never going to get my bachelor's degree.

After a few years of working at Las Positas, an opportunity came up to apply for an entry level job in the district MIS (later to be known as ITS) department back at Chabot. Since I was still attending Cal State, it would be easier to commute between Chabot and CSUH. Fortunately, I was hired by Tom Gerrits in 1999 as a User Support Specialist and set up the new MIS/ITS Help Desk. I enjoyed my new job with a great group of people.

By the time I graduated from CSUH in 2002 I was living comfortably on my ITS income, and I couldn't imagine giving up such a good job to go do a year without pay to earn the requisite teaching credential. The next eighteen years working in ITS just seemed to fly by.



Chabot's Automotive Technology Program continues to steer students towards success.

It's inevitable – at some point, we'll all be taking a family vehicle in for service or repair, and then possibly worry whether the shop will do the job right. And today's vehicles have more in common with your computer than vehicles of old. The extensive use of chips, networks, cameras, radar, and other advanced technologies have resulted in needing technicians who are closer to an engineer than the auto mechanics we might have known growing up.

But CARE members everywhere can take heart that automotive technicians who graduated from Chabot's Automotive

Technology program are still some of the best around.

With more than 250 students coming to Chabot with a declared automotive major, the program is thriving, and it remains one of the top disciplines at the college awarding certificates and degrees. It is accredited by the Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) Program, and not only are all faculty are ASE Certified Technicians, most are ASE Master level; the current team all have more than 35 years as technicians and educators, and all continue to complete at least 20 hours a year of technical training to learn new systems and use new diagnostic tools and equipment. Indeed, most faculty far exceed that time, typically at their own time and expense.



Chabot's program includes more than 15 credit and non-credit courses that cover fundamental vehicle systems to technologies used on 2025 vehicles, and utilize state-of the art tools and equipment to provide students first hand-on experiences with what they will be using in the industry. Classes are scheduled mornings, afternoons, evenings, and even some online, to support students who might already be working.

Chabot was one of the first programs, not just in California, but across the country to offer Hybrid and Electric Vehicle instruction as a separate class, and also one of the first programs to offer Advanced Drivers Assistance System (ADAS) instruction as a separate class. The faculty and administrative team have forged partnerships with local, state and national employers, including: Ford, Hyundai, Mercedes-Benz, Subaru, and Volkswagen, as well as with tool & equipment companies like Hunter, MATCO Tools, and Snap On Tools. Chabot's Auto Tech graduates are employed throughout the Bay Area, the state, and our nation in automotive and related industry positions, including High-tech companies like: Tesla, Rivian, Lucid, ZOOX working on state-of-the-art vehicles and systems.



So the next time you take your car in for service, ask if a Chabot graduate is working there. You'll be in good hands!
